A Message from The Chief Executive Officer of The Arc

The State That Went Backward Connecticut pulls plug on vulnerable people

write this on the first Furlough Day ever imposed on nonprofits in Connecticut. Once among the top five states in supporting vulnerable people and families, Connecticut among America's richest states - has fallen to the bottom

percentile.

If it is not bad enough that nonprofits like The Arc New London County provide better quality services at one-half to one-fifth the cost that Connecticut can provide them itself, the state added insult to injury by refusing to pay The Arc and its employees anything at all on July 26, and families were upset to discover The Arc's Community Life & Advocacy program was canceled in July. We understand.

Did you know The Arc

NLC raises most CL&A monies via Strides, the Film Festival and other community fundraisers? The state pays not a penny.

Budget rescissions left us no choice but to pull together and share the sacrifice. Thanks to all who called, emailed, rallied. Advocacy matters!

Families were upset to discover The Arc's Community Life & Advocacy program was canceled in July.

Disability Advocates Rally at State Capitol to Pass Budget



A though the Connecticut General Assembly met behind closed doors on July 18 to try —in vain—to finalize the state budget, all were aware of the hundreds right outside those doors, who'd come to implore legislators to pass a budget that supported people with disabilities and helped those most in need. In a "SOS—Save our Services" rally arranged by The Arc Connecticut, people from agencies including The Arc

NLC, Connecticut Cross Disability Lifespan Alliance, MARC, Our Families Can't Wait, and The Arc of Southington

to name a few, traveled to Hartford to make their voices heard. The group first had an orientation at the Legislative Office Building on how to approach a legislator, then marched to the Capitol

where they gave testimony, held a vigil and engaged in civil disobedience. Liz, an Arc NLC Shooting Stars participant, provided testimony, and like most of The Arc NLC participants, was really happy to be part of the day's activities. "I let 'em have it," she said with a big grin.

"We're here today because the legislature hasn't passed a budget," said Edwin "Win" Evarts, the executive director of The Arc Connecticut. "The result of this policy decision is there is a loss of services and program closures." Rep. Mike Demicco of Farmington applauded those present for converging on the Capitol. "You brought a human face to the budget problem," Demicco said. "Keep up the good work."

Real Work for Real Pay: An Arc NLC micro-enterprise update



The Arc NLC's four micro-enterprises all grew a little closer to self-sustainability this year—from a \$10,000 donation from the Dominion Foundation to offset the costs of a commercial bakery oven to the new partnership with Sure Bright Commercial Cleaning of Norwich, who've recently added five members of The Arc's Employment Transition Center to their professional team

The Lawn and Landscape business (lower right) was able to operate with **two crews** this year, increasing both revenue and training opportunities thanks to last fall's equipment grant from the **Edward and Mary Lord Foundation**. And the ever-popular **Farm Stand at 1671 Center Groton Rd (Rt. 117) in Ledyard** is in full swing, open M-F 8:30-1:45pm, W-F 4-6pm, and Sat 9-5pm. A grant from the **Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut** will soon **double produce volume**. And a pilot CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) project was highly successful—shares sold out almost overnight! 4

"I really miss my friends, and the things we do in the community." -What a month with no CL&A services feels like

ach month, Community Life & Advocacy lacksquare puts out an activity calendar full of events, support groups, and volunteer opportunities. But this July, for the first time in memory, there was no calendar, and there were no events. Because of the state budget impasse, CL&A had



to curtail programs for the month, leaving 170 people with I/DD without access to familiar routines, friends, and life skills opportunities. "It

really makes me upset," says Tiffiny (I). "I miss doing my volunteer activities." Elena (center) agrees. "I want to see friends and socialize after work, and now I can't." CL&A, The Arc NLC's oldest program, receives no state or federal funds and relies on fundraising and donations from area foundations to provide a wide array of support and recreation services—including door-to-door transportation—to people from

all over southeastern Connecticut. The budget impasse, however, means that The Arc must use all available resources for essential services. Life Skills Instructor Jenna Marchenkoff (above,r), of the In-Home Supports without his Volunteer Corps program, sees firsthand

what a month of no programming means. "For many of our participants, CL&A is the only opportunity to interact with others, establish relationships, learn new skills, be out in the community. It also puts a huge strain on working parents who depend on this program."

The CL&A team managed to keep the Volunteer Corps and Special Olympics going for August, but it's been a rough summer. 4

evin's in a quandary. So many decisions:
Should he continue to be on The Arc NLC's
Special Olympics softball team . . . or pursue
his dream of being an actor and model? "There
just isn't enough time in a day." Kevin sighs. He's
enjoying a rare free moment before starting his
day as a member of the Lawn and Landscape
crew. "I love being outdoors, and Tim [his job
coach] is teaching me a lot. But I want to do
other things too." He's taking acting classes
at night. "We do improv, practice auditions
for commercials, stuff like that. I love the

Kevin's lived in the area all his life. "I was bullied in school for a while," he says. "But my friends stood up for me. Then I went to NFA (Norwich Free Academy) and was in the Spread the Word video and now that same kid is jealous of me." Kevin lives with his mom now, but he has plans. "I'm pretty independent. Right now I'm helping her with some of the bills—like the cable bill—and I do laundry and cook—I really like



that." In fact, Kevin had been part of The Arc's Culinary program before he switched to the Lawn crew. "I like being at The Arc. They have so many different programs and Bonnie (The Director of Business and Transition at the Employment Transition Center) is amazing. I want to be on the cleaning crew next.

I think it's important to try new things and learn different skills."

Kevin manages to squeeze in time with friends, and participates in many of Community Life

& Advocacy activities, including the birthday socials, bowling, and trips to museums and regional events, where he socializes with his friends. Kevin also mastered the Comcast sponsored digital literacy class, and used his new skills to set up his mom's Facebook account for



her. "She's getting pretty good at it now." How did this past July's lack of CL&A programs due to budget cuts change his life? Kevin grows pensive. "You know, I called Governor Malloy a bunch of times, but they'd turned off his voice mail. If I could talk to him I'd tell him that I know he loves his family, but to think about other people too. Sometimes it's not just about you, or me. I love my family too, and I want him to know that what they're doing [by not passing the budget] is hurting people like me, and our families, and other people like homeless people. I worry about homeless people."

"I want the Governor to care about people. I know he's nice but now he's hurting The Arc and other places like this. I want him to go forward and to do his job. If he doesn't want to . . . well, then I will!"

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Our Community Partners Make Dreams Come True

Without the help of these generous foundations and organizations, many of the services we provide to people with I/DD would not exist.

The Arc NLC's Farm Stand received \$200 from the Ledyard Garden Club for muchneeded tools and seedlings. The Eastern CT Association of Realtors provided \$750 needed to repair a well pump for irrigating the Farm Stand garden. The aquaponics facility will be expanded this year thanks to a \$15,000 grant from the Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut, more than doubling production of specialty greens and herbs. Friends at the Dominion Foundation and DEPCOM Power invested in The Arc NLC's cookie microenterprise with two \$10,000 grants to offset the cost of a commercial bakery oven.

Digital Literacy got a great boost from the **Comcast Foundation**, which awarded The Arc NLC a 2-year, \$20,000 grant for Internet safety and computer literacy courses at the **Employment Transition Center** in Groton. Comcast also created a PSA and a 4-minute video presentation, **Comcast Introduces The Arc.** Visit it at youtube.com/results? search guery=comcast+the+arc.

Many agencies stepped up to keep Community Life & Advocacy alive. Generous donations included \$4,000 from the Gernon Trust, \$3,000 from the Savings Institute Foundation \$1,000 from the Eastern Savings Bank Foundation and \$600 from the AHEPA Foundation. And of course the Knights of Columbus always make sure CL&A receives funds from the annual Tootsie Roll Drive; this season The Arc NLC received \$500 from post 7054 and \$993 from Local Council 13.

The Arc's Norwich facility received \$995 from the Ledyard Rotary to install a much needed Automated External Defibrillator (AED). Also of great benefit was a new 9-passenger wheelchair van funded by the Federal Transportation Administration and administered by CT DOT and the Southeastern Council of Governments (SECCOG). Thank you all!

Cheryl: How long have you been working with the Lawn and Landscape crew at The Arc?
Tim: This year will be my third year.

Cheryl: How many crew members are there?
Tim: Right now four, but we get a high school kid during the fall and winter.

community Life & Advocacy participants and staff unanimously nominated "Chef Greg's" Mac & Cheese as their official favorite recipe. **Greg McMahon, who's been with The Arc NLC since 1994, is the Special Olympics Coordinator and cooks for the majority of CL&A's birthday socials.** His macaroni and cheese is everyone's hands-down favorite. Kevin, featured on p.3, calls it "fantastic."

Chef Greg's Famous Mac & Cheese

Ingredients:

1/2 pound elbow macaroni

4 tblsp unsalted butter – cut into bits

1 Dash Tabasco sauce

1 can evaporated milk – (12 ounce)

1 pound sharp cheddar cheese – grated

2 large eggs – beaten

1 tsp dry mustard, dissolved in 1 tsp water

2 tsp Salt, Pepper, Toasted Bread Crumbs

1 cup fresh bread crumbs

1 pinch salt

1 1/2tbsp unsalted butter – melted

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 350.

Boil the macaroni until just barely done in salted water. Drain and toss with the butter in a large, ovenproof mixing bowl. Mix the Tabasco into the evaporated milk. Reserving about 1/3 cup, stir the milk into the macaroni, then add 3/4 of the cheese, the eggs and the mustard. When well



combined, season to taste with salt and pepper and set the bowl in the oven. Every five minutes, remove it briefly to stir in some of the reserved cheese, adding more evaporated milk as necessary to keep the mixture moist and smooth. When all the cheese has been incorporated and the mixture is nicely hot and creamy (which should take 20 minutes all told), crumble Ritz crackers over it and serve at once. Serves 6.
